Worship Resources for Trees of Life: Hope for God's Earth

The first and last chapters of the Bible feature the "tree of life" as a critical part in the community of creation. While the Christian calendar does not have a special day to celebrate trees, the Jewish calendar does on Tu BiShvat or Tu BiShevat, a holiday for ecological awareness and planting trees. Canada has Arbor Week the last Friday in April to the first Sunday in May and the United States has Arbor Day on the last Friday in April each year.

This time in spring is a good opportunity to celebrate and plant trees for creation care and climate action. Trees are the best, most cost-efficient natural climate solution. Trees not only sequester carbon, cool the planet, and slow climate change, but support biodiversity and provide an array of amazing other benefits.

This packet provides worship resources for congregations who wish to focus on trees of life in the ecology of God's creation.

Suggested scriptures

Genesis 2:4b-9, 15. If the congregation prefers an inclusive version, consider this selection from *The Inclusive Bible*:

At the time when YHWH made the heavens and the Earth, there was still no wild bush on the Earth nor had any wild plant sprung up, for YHWH had not yet sent rain to the Earth, and there was no human being to till the soil. Instead, a flow of water would well up from the ground and irrigate the soil. So YHWH fashioned an earth creature out of the clay of the earth, and blew into its nostrils the breath of life. And the earth creature became a living being.

YHWH planted a garden to the east, in Eden, and placed in it the earth creature that had been made. Then YHWH caused every kind of tree that is pleasant to the sight and good to eat to spring from the soil. In the center of the garden was the Tree of Life, and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. . .

Then YHWH took the earth creature and settled it in the garden of Eden so that it might cultivate and care for the land.

Additional scriptures if desired: Luke 21:29-32; Revelation 22:1-5

Sermon focus

Trees are critical in the ecosystems of God's creation. In the beginning, God created trees for the Earth (Genesis 1:11-12) and placed the "tree of life" in the garden (Genesis 2:8-15). This woodland garden represents what God intended: beauty, biodiversity, and abundance where trees give life for all on Earth. In the last chapter of the Bible, we see the "tree of life" again producing fruit and leaves for healing the world (Revelation 22:1-2). The vision is of a healthy, vibrant planet where God's abundant life of shalom is enjoyed by all from generation to generation. Trees play an essential role in this vision. Trees provide essential ecosystem services and valuable benefits for our communities. (See Jessica B. As stewards of creation, God calls us to serve and protect the Earth (Genesis 2:15).

- How do trees provide "life" in the community of God's creation?
- What in these articles was new or stood out to you?
- Why, according to these articles, are trees so critical for the Earth?
- Of the various ecosystem services and community benefits of trees, what do you especially value?
- Where have you planted trees and what has planting and caring for trees been like for you?
- How might we—our households or congregation—participate in or support the Mennonite JoinTrees campaign to plant a million trees to help restore God's Earth?
